

Michael David Wilson

From a pint-sized slugger on a T-ball team called the Hawks to a 34-year MSBL veteran, Mike Wilson's name has echoed across the fields of Southern California to Sacramento with a bat in hand, dirt on his cleats, and an unmistakable spark in his eye. Born in 1961 in the heart of Southern California, Michael's baseball journey began the way it often does for legends—in the sun-soaked innocence of Little League. At just five years old, he joined his first team, the Hawks, and it wasn't long before the kid with the sweet swing became the

player everyone watched. That early love for the game wasn't just about the crack of the bat or the thrill of the win. It was about the lifelong bonds born between chalk lines.

By the time he was a sophomore, Michael had earned a spot on his high school's varsity team, an early nod to his talent. At 18, he was already playing for the Downey A's, and soon after, he relocated to Sacramento.

In Sacramento, the game didn't slow down—it deepened. At age 30, Michael began playing in the City League, where his presence at the plate quickly became a thing of legend. Pitchers learned to dread the sight of him stepping into the batter's box. He wore the number 911—a tongue-in-cheek nod to the emergency he caused for anyone on the mound. (Later changed to 91)

But it wasn't just what he did on the field that earned him respect. It was the way he showed up off the field. When he wasn't anchoring his City League team, Michael was pouring his heart into coaching Little League. Not for trophies or titles,

but for the pure, unfiltered love of the game. He coached all of his children, offering them not just skills but memories—of dusty hands, high-fives, and the sacred rhythm of springtime baseball. More than that, he passed down a piece of wisdom that stuck with them for life: "Keep your eye on the ball." On the field, it sharpened their focus. Off the field, it became a quiet mantra—for staying centered, staying present, and never losing sight of what really matters.

At 30, he joined the Men's Senior Baseball League (MSBL), and became a fixture, a friend, and a force. Decade after decade, through countless seasons and changing rosters, Michael stayed steady. He didn't just play; he *belonged*. And more than the stats or standings, what mattered to him most was the camaraderie—the friendships forged over cold Gatorades and double plays, the respect earned not by dominance, but by devotion.

He had a way of lightening the mood and lifting others up—unless you were pitching to him. Ask anyone who's played with or against him, and they'll tell you the same thing: Michael David Wilson is a ballplayer's ballplayer. He brought grit, grace, and a little mischief to every field he stepped on. He respected the game and everything it stood for, and the game respected him right back. His induction into the SMSBL Baseball Hall of Fame is more than a milestone a celebration of a man who lived baseball. Who believed that a game played well could teach you everything you need to know about life: how to keep showing up, how to handle failure with humor, how to celebrate success with humility, and how to play for something bigger than yourself.

Michael didn't just accumulate stats—he built a legacy. One that lives in every player he coached, every teammate he backed up, and every friend he made from first pitch to final out.

As we welcome him into the SMSBL Hall of Fame, we do so not just in honor of his accomplishments—but in celebration of his spirit. Because at the end of the day, the greatest players aren't just remembered for what they did. They're remembered for how they made the game feel.



Teena Van Ness

Teena grew up on wheat farm in Eastern Washington in the small farming community of LaCrosse population of approximately 450. Teena is the youngest of 6 children. Growing up on a farm taught Teena at a very young age a strong work ethic, the sense of community and what Teena calls the "gift of giving".

Teena's mom Eileen was a very active in the community. Whether it was helping to raise money for the 4H, the school or other community events or to help a neighbor she was there to help in any way needed and as Teena became an adult in the same community and raising her children she continued the same tradition.

In late 2002 Teena met the love her life and the country girl made

the move to the city of Sacramento in 2003 and started her new adventure with her "Baseballnut." She married Alan Van Ness on December 31,2004.

Teena has supported Alan and his love and passion for the game of Baseball and the SMSBL from the beginning. In early 2015 while Teena was employed with UC Davis Health System, she was part of their Employee Volunteer Giving program and discovered the Sacramento Blue Star Moms. The Blue Star Moms is a national organization recognized by Congress. They are a group of moms who have raised military children and raise money to send care packages to our service members deployed. Teena realized that she was also considered a blue star mom as her son Levi was at that time active duty with the US Army and deployed in Kuwait. Teena joined the Sacramento chapter of the Blue Star Moms and in September of 2015 she was nominated and voted in as President.

Alan became President of the SMSBL in 2015 so with both Teena and Alan being Presidents of large organizations life was very busy. Teena's duties as President included representing her organization at a wide variety of charitable events while organizing fundraising events for her Sacramento Blue Star Moms chapter.

As the SMSBL continued to grow and helping Alan with all of the behind the scenes administrative stuff for the league and both being so busy with both organizations in 2019 Teena resigned her duty as President of the Sacramento Blue Star Moms to be able to support Alan in his duties as President of the SMSBL.

William Ryan Clouse, aka: Billy

Billy's journey started in 1967 at Fruitridge Little League! Skipping coast league going straight to the Miners! At 10 years old he was drafted into the Majors.

At 15yrs old Billy had an accident with a rope swing! Multiple injuries including dislocation and fracture of his right elbow, along with tendon damage. Doctors said he would never throw another baseball with his right arm. With hard work and PT six months later, he made the Senior League all stars with a batting average of 667. To this day he's still on the mound pitching 9-Innings.


Baseball is in the Nogosek blood with his two sons playing baseball and his daughter playing softball. Troy enjoyed coaching all of his children in multiple sports.

But he did acclimate towards the end of the year, and that's where he first strapped on the catchers gear in practice. He was the starting catcher for the next three years and the All Star catcher as a twelve years old. At thirteen Rick tried out for the Belmont San Mateo Babe Ruth League where he played for three years. At thirteen he first realized that the throw was a long way to second base . Again he acclimated to the larger field and became the thirteen year old All Star catcher. That was where he first caught some kid from Belmont named Ken Jungston. Rick again made the Babe

Ruth All Stars. Rick played his High School Baseball at Hillsdale High in San Mateo earning his white letter H, which meant the team came in first in the Mid Peninsula League.

After High School Ricks playing days were over and he enrolled in the Machine Tool Technology Coarse at the College of San Mateo. During his second year at CSM he met a young nursing student named Vickie. They would date for five years until Vickie graduated from Nursing School. They married in 1981, meanwhile Rick and his older brother started Graduate Machining. Fast forward sixteen years and three kids later the shop was expanding and required an electrician to wire up more machines. That electrician was Steve Welch. Steve told Rick about the SMSBL and gave him Fred Creal's number. Fred told Rick to come on down to Land Park on Sunday and join the Boys of Summer. Rick's first at bat in twenty two years was with the bases loaded and his team behind by two runs. He worked the pitcher to a full count and hit a shot to right center to tie the game. That was the beginning of Ricks adult baseball career. It was 1997 and Vickie had finally got a day position which allowed Rick to play night baseball with Fred's Tigers in the 40+ division. After a few years playing with the Tigers some guy from Belmont joined the team, that's right, Ken Jungston. Talk about going full circle as Rick continues to be Ken's catcher on various teams.

What Rick love's the most about playing adult baseball is being able to play in the Father/Son Tournaments with his two boys Ryan and Shane in Arizona and Father's Day in Sacramento. It doesn't get any better than being able to get behind the plate and catch your own son.

When Rick turned 60 he joined the 60+ Golden Division. He was placed on Jim Tygrett-DeNuzzi's Yankees. Jim stepped away from managing the Yankees and Rick became the manager. With Jim's blessing the team name was changed to the Colt 45's. At 69 (league age) Rick is still strapping on the catchers gear. When he gets behind the dish now his first thought is, damn that's still a long way to second base. On some game days you may find Rick all over the diamond pitching, playing infield and outfield too.

Rick has several league championships playing with Fred Creal's Tigers, plus his most recent Colt 45s. He's also got multiple MSBL tournament wins in Las Vegas and San Diego. Rick's commitment and loyalty to the SMSBL is evident as a player, manager, teammate and contributor. A few years ago Rick donated a John Deere riding mower to the SMSBL, and still being used. Rick's ability as a player, commitment to managing, and sense of community are SMSBL Hall of Fame qualities being recognized.
